OUR GOAL

An accessible and non-intimidating event that supports people with a variety of backgrounds and skills, and is - above all —a fun way to explore potential for games to promote sustainability.

Toward that end, we've pulled together some resources to help you think about how teams can work together, game-making tools, and an environmental issue you might be inspired to tackle. We've kept this brief because the point isn't to create the perfect game (really!!!!), but to have fun and be part of a collaborative and creative process.

GAME-MAKING AND PROTOTYPING TOOLS

Although digital game development platforms are getting much easier to use, there is strong consensus that a weekend is not long enough to become adept at using one AND produce a working game prototype. So individuals and teams without previous experience using game engines to develop digital games will be strongly encouraged to use other tools that allow them to hit the ground running. Below is a table of possible tools and platforms (maybe you know of others!) and how hard they are to start using. Registered participants should think about which tools are accessible for them right away, but also might use this list to explore some new tools. We will have a bunch of basic prototyping supplies on hand for physical/paper gaming, including access to some printing stations. We'll also have tables, power, and wifi — teams and individuals should plan to bring any other supplies or materials needed.



Composting confusion rampant in UW waste bins, study finds

A study of waste bins at the University of Washington's Seattle campus revealed that 88 percent of the contents in trash bins could have been recycled or composted. Most – 72 percent – of what didn't belong in trash bins turned out to be compostable items, such as food, carry-out containers and paper coffee cups.

"Food waste is the single most significant contaminant in trash bins," said Jack Johnson, a UW archaeology graduate student who leads the UW Garbology Project. "It is clear that most contamination stems from people throwing the contents of their on-campus meals, including foods and compostable/recyclable packaging, into trash bins," he wrote in a report (pdf) posted this week summarizing the project's findings.
